we enroll 486,000 students and employ 56,000 faculty and staff. Established in

1960, the mission of the CSU is to provide high-quality, affordable education to

meet the ever-changing needs of California and its workforce of today and tomorrow. With its commitment to quality, opportunity, student success and

educational equity, the CSU is renowned for superb teaching, innovative research

and producing job-ready graduates. Each year, the CSU awards more than 130,000

degrees. In fact, one in every 10 California employees has earned a CSU degree,

while one in every 20 Americans holding a college degree is a graduate of the

CSU. Our global alumni base is more than 4 million strong.

The CSU is proud to be the nation's most diverse and, I firmly believe, its most

consequential university. The CSU educates the most ethnically, economically and

academically diverse student body in the nation and creates opportunity for

students of California to reach their educational goals and become our state's and

nation's future leaders. Approximately 10,000 students enrolled at the CSU are

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undocumented. The CSU estimates that 500 of our employees have DACA status. Indeed, some of the CSU's brightest students and most dedicated employees are Dreamers and they are found on each of our 23 campuses. They, like their peers, seek a better life for themselves and their families, and they powerfully contribute to the strength of the university and their own communities through service and leadership.

These individuals were raised in the United States and, to many, this is the only home they have ever known. Absent the protection afforded by DACA, these important members of our university community would not be able to legally work to provide for their families and would be haunted by the reality that they might, at any time, be removed from the country that has been their home, and separated from their families and friends.

It is important that our Dreamers be allowed to continue to positively contribute to our economy and society, much as they have for many years. California and the CSU have long recognized the economic and societal contributions of our immigrant community and have worked to provide undocumented students with access to the state's public higher education systems. The DACA program helps our Dreamers to complete their education, build their careers and carve out their legacies – a result that well serves California and our nation, and one that is aligned with the CSU's core principles of inclusive excellence and empowering upward social mobility.

The CSU applauds the effort by the Department of Homeland Security to strengthen and fortify the DACA program. However, the proposed rule falls short of a permanent solution — one that will allow our Dreamers to achieve their personal, educational and professional goals. The CSU continues to urge Congress to take swift, bipartisan legislative action toward a much-needed permanent and forward-focused solution so that our Dreamers can continue to fulfill their human potential as they strengthen our campuses, communities, state and nation.
